Jubilee Year of Mercy


"The Church must be a place of mercy freely given, where everyone can feel welcomed, loved, forgiven, and encouraged to live the good life of the Gospel."

Both young and old are included in the message from Pope Francis as he encourages everyone to share in expressions and works of mercy with one another. Through his declaration dedicating 2016 as a Jubilee Year of Mercy, Pope Francis has opened the Holy Door for us to apply the many facets of mercy to all of God's children. Although our Residents are often the recipients of many acts of mercy through the kindness of staff, volunteers, benefactors and Little Sisters, it is important that our elderly are included in this reawakening.

Msgr. Lemon agreed to share the vision and meaning of

the Works of Mercy with our Residents through weekly group sessions during Lent. In these small group sessions, there were plenty of opportunities to share in the many expressions of mercy through both corporal and spiritual acts. Understanding the meaning of mercy and the concept of how the elderly can be messengers of mercy was discussed in detail. They learned that their past experiences raising their own families incorporated constant acts of mercy. This is an attitude and a way of life which continues with their new family members at Jeanne Jugan. Msgr. Lemon explained to the group that they indeed were a part of a unique group where no one was excluded. Each and every Resident was in God's grace



when they applied their own actions and words through kindness and forgiveness of one another.

St. Jeanne Jugan understood the meaning of mercy when she opened her "door" to those who needed comfort and love in their darkest time. Our Residents are now the catalysts of this mercy and have dedicated their Lenten efforts to providing assistance to those less mobile, visiting those Residents who are more infirm, offering positive words of encouragement, complimenting someone and listening to their family of Residents through patience, hope and love.

No story is complete without a happy ending! Thus, Nancy was offered a part-time position as an assistant working in the Activities Department. She is now able to work directly with our Residents on group activities while Laura continues her journey with personal visits as she accompanies her Mom to work every week. Chapel Renovations


Because of the age of our chapel, we face serious structural and accessibility issues which are causing safety concerns for our
