
The Little Sisters are forever grateful for the graces we receive from all who share in the care of our little family and we pray daily for your families and their intentions. Thank you!

Mother Margaret Regina's Golden Jubilee

On, May 13, Mother Margaret Regina celebrated her Golden Jubilee, marking fifty years of consecrated life as a Little Sister of

the Poor at the service of the elderly. Mother chose to celebrate her Jubilee on the 100th anniversary of the apparition of Our Lady of Fatima to the three shepherd children, which took place on May 13, 1917. The actual day of her religious profession was in the spring on April 18, 1967.

The apparition of Our Lady of Fatima is very special to Mother Margaret Regina for several reasons. While attending Most Blessed Sacrament School, she volunteered with the Little Sisters of

those they served, she was invited to make the consecration to our Blessed Mother. The second reason she chose this feast is the foundress of the Little Sisters, St. Jeanne Jugan loved the rosary. She counseled the novices, in her day, to stay close to Mary, as she would be their Mother. The third reason is Mother Margaret Regina's family strove to pray the family rosary together daily.

Mother Margaret Regina added that one sees in this apparition a "Mother's" concern for her

children, as well as the importance of being faithful to one's duty, to pray and to offer little sacrifices for one another.

In her apparitions at Fatima Our Lady asked the children to pray the rosary daily. During the final apparition, on October 13, 1917, St. Joseph with the Child Jesus, who made the sign of the cross over the crowds, appeared with Our Lady, signifying the importance of family life. In responding to this plea of the Mother of God, she assured the children that peace would come about in the world if we heeded her plea, especially her request for prayers for the conversion of Russia.

The Fatima statue pictured below was recently given to Mother Margaret by her friends. They also volunteered at the home with her when they were in school. They remain close friends and knew that she loved this feast day. They decided to not only honor her Jubilee, but also make it an occasion of prayer, remembering especially her nephew Christopher, who recently died.

The family is Catherine's central interest along with a devout spiritual life. She says the rosary with Mother Angelica and if she is unable to attend Mass, she watches it on EWTN. She revealed, "I pray all the time and God has answered. It has been both a hard and joyful life."
